3.5 Temporal plan of academic work in the University All the programmes follow trimester based system. Semester system/ The University articulates a detailed annual academic calendar. It is further customised depending on Annual system programme requirements by the respective Dean / Chairperson. This academic calendar includes the teaching dates, exam dates, holidays etc. This helps in structuring the teaching plan for all the programmes in the University. The placement office facilitates the internships to be done by the students through contacts with the companies or relevant organisations. In MBA programme, faculty guides are allotted for SIP. In IFMR Graduate School of Business (IFMR GSB), most of the courses are of 3-credits each. However, IFMR GSB also offers courses of 1, 1.5 and 2.5-credits. One credit is equivalent to 10 contact hours. In SIAS, most of the courses are of 3 or 4 credits each. One credit is equivalent to 15 contact hours. Course curriculum consists of core and elective credits. While the Programme Office registers all students to the core (mandatory) courses, students get an option to choose electives based on their area of interest keeping in mind the required courses to be done in a particular area. While preparing the time tables, the programme office checks the student choices to decide on the course combinations to be offered in a particular time slot. Innovation such as modular curricula Inter/multidisciplinary approach Curriculum at SIAS (UG School) consists of general education courses (called as Core and Skills courses) and courses in the Major or Minor. Additionally, students will also undertake research projects and mandatory internships, which provides them the experience of industry as well as social immersion. Curriculum is modular in nature and addresses both knowledge as well as skills necessary for the contemporary world. Training in majors and minors will consist of required and electives, with very specific learning outcomes.

Further, inter/multidisciplinary approach is a hallmark of Krea's educational philosophy. Curriculum development involves all faculty as course outlines are shared with the broader faculty body so that their views can be solicited and incorporated. Developing courses as well as team teaching across disciplines is highly encouraged. Cross listing of courses in different disciplines as electives is common. All faculty workshops are frequently organized in order to facilitate curriculum development as well as fine tuning of pedagogical and assessment approaches.

IFMR GSB

In the spirit of multidisciplinary approach, faculty at the university are required to present the course outlines pertaining to their courses to the broader faculty body comprising of faculty from all areas so as to solicit their views and to refine the curriculum keeping in view the inputs from across the areas. This is an on-going activity at the university that is aimed at ensuring that general academic rigor in and multidisciplinary approach in particular is deeply ingrained in the course offerings of University for its students. Such faculty body meetings where in the course outlines of all courses across all areas and are presented to the entire faculty body and serves as a gateway to discuss and highlight innovative teaching pedagogies.

Several new courses like Design Thinking & Problem Solving; Ethics, Business & Society pertain to interwoven learning, a very important USP at Krea.

Additionally interdisciplinary courses

		workshops are also offered such as Basic Econometrics, Supply Chain Finance, Derivatives & Risk Management, Fixed Income Securities, Pricing & Revenue Optimization, Fintech Workshop, Private Equity & Entrepreneurship workshop etc.
5.5	Has the University conducted an academic audit? If yes, please give details regarding frequency and its usage.	An External Review Team comprising of, Prof Raghu Sundaram, (Stern School of Business, USA), Prof Rishikesh Krishnan (Director, IIM Indore) and Prof V Anantha Nageswaran (Faculty, Singapore Management University) undertook an extensive review of all aspects of the university ranging from curriculum, admissions, placement, MDP, alumni affairs, student affairs, infrastructure and facilities on February 12-13, 2018. External Review is conducted once in 5 years. In the case of the School of Interwoven Arts and Sciences, a new UG curriculum was implemented in 2019 and as such is being reviewed in 2022-23 as the first batch of graduates has passed out. This opportunity is also being taken to introduce the curriculum for the Four-Year Undergraduate Program, which is being implemented as per UGC directives from the academic year 2023-24.
5.6	Apart from classroom instruction, what are the other avenues of learning provided for the students? (Example: Projects, Internships, Field	It is Krea University's strong belief that students learn more by immersing themselves in a 'real world' learning environment, which will be achieved by

creating more 'porous boundaries' between trainings, Seminars, etc.) the real world and the class room. To fulfil this requirement, students need to take up internships or projects (graded) during summer breaks. Upon commencement of Summer Internship each student of the university is assigned a faculty who will serve as summer internship guide. In addition, the student concerned is expected to seek guidance and appropriate counsel from his/her corporate mentor at the place of work. Summer internship constitutes equivalent of one full credit course and hence it is taken very seriously by all stakeholders. Students are expected to furnish, deliverables such as joining reports, interim progress reports and final project reports as they progress during the course of their internship. Further, students are exposed to simulations and games as part of their curriculum. Lastly, there is a dedicated Alumni & External Relations committee at the university that works round the clock to invite industry experts to speak on a variety of topics. Such events are organised as Conclaves, Seminars, Guest Lectures, and Symposiums, from time to time. 5.7 Please provide details of the examination Faculty at Krea will continuously rigorously evaluate students using multiple system (Whether examination based or practical based) evaluation components such as quizzes, class participation, short exams, papers and final exams. No course will have a single unit of assessment to determine the entire course grade. Faculty will have the flexibility to decide on the structure depending on the subject. Science degrees have both practical exams and theory exams. The arts degrees, MBA degree and Ph.D. degrees in management evaluation criteria that are combination of theory and applicationoriented components.

For each UG course, in addition to a grade that will appear on the official transcript, there will also be a "subjective assessment" of the student's "learning habits" and other intangible aspects of a student's performance in the course.

In the PhD programme, students are evaluated during the coursework using multiple evaluation components in each There are written comprehensive examinations to assess the performance at the end of the coursework. The Doctoral Dissertation Committee / Research Advisory Committee evaluates the the doctoral doctoral proposal and dissertation of each student. In the final stage, the dissertation is evaluated by external examiners. A public viva voce is conducted for defending the thesis, and evaluation is done by the members of the Research Advisory Council and at least one external examiner who are present at the event. On successful passing the public viva voce, and on approval by the Academic Council, the doctoral student is granted the PhD degree in Management by Krea University.

5.8	What methods of evaluation of answer scripts does the University follow? Whether external experts are invited for evaluation?	External evaluation is mandated for Ph.D. dissertation and Viva voce. In all other cases, Krea faculty members evaluate the answer scripts. In cases of request for re-evaluation, support of external faculty members is sought. Further details are available in the Exams Manual. After results are declared, students have the option of seeking re-evaluation and a Krea faculty member capable of teaching that specific course will undertake re-evaluation. If such expertise is not available within Krea, then an external scholar is found to complete re-evaluation.

Malpractice cases reported during the exam and identified during evaluation are penalized as per the disciplinary action process guidelines detailed in the exam manual. 5.10	Does the University have a continuous internal evaluation system?	Continuous evaluation is core to every course offered at Krea. Every course in every degree program has more than 1 evaluation component. The students are provided with a course outline that provides details of course evaluation components.

5.11	How are the question papers set to ensure the achievement of the course objectives?	Course outlines/syllabi of each course at the university contain course description followed by course objectives, learning outcomes and assessment schemes. Further, efforts are undertaken to ensure that course deliverables such as assignments / projects / examinations are anchored on appropriate learning outcomes. This is conveyed by the faculty concerned in the course outline document, which is shared with all students prior to the commencement of the course. These syllabi/course outlines are also shared with the Academic and Examination offices, for both documentation as well as oversight purposes.
5.12	State the policy of the University for the constitution of board of question paper setters, board of examiners and invigilators.	As the University follows a continuous assessment model, which is implemented by the concerned faculty teaching the course, the entire responsibility of assessment resides with the individual faculty. However, the BOS will have reviewed the assessment scheme. Depending on the need, the individual faculty will request the Controller of Examinations for support to conduct examination, including the invigilation process. COE supervises the invigilation; ensures that the question papers are set as per norms by the faculty team and that the question paper remains confidential; manages the examinations as per declared schedule; ensures that there is no malpractice during exams and in the case of such offenses, initiates disciplinary actions; and finally oversees evaluation, declaration of results and the revaluation process as per norms. All the examinations at the university are supervised by the Programme Chair, the Programme Committee and the faculty concerned. When it comes to invigilation the university seeks the services of Teaching Assistants and Ph.D. Scholars. Lastly, the responsibility for setting the question paper, evaluation and submission of grades wholly and solely rests with the faculty concerned.




